- Separated from Australia and Antarctica 75 – 80 million years ago
- Developed from movement of the Australian and Pacific plates
- The tip of the mostly submerged Zealandia continent
- Affected by earthquakes and volcanos
- Isolated for 80 million years

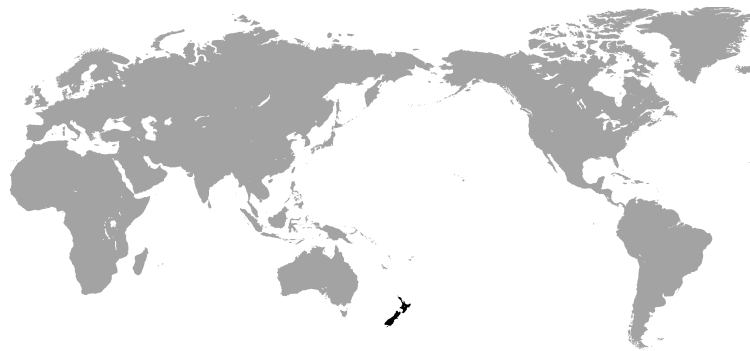
New Zealand

- Immigration
- Eastern Polynesians 1250 – 1300
- Europeans
- Abel Tasman 1642, Nova Zeelandia
- Captain James Cook 1769, New Zealand
- Jean de Surville arrived two months later
- Marc-Joseph Marion du Fresne landed in 1772
- Treaty of Waitangi 1840 effectively closing out the French
- Independence 1947
- French sink Greenpeace Rainbow Warrior in Auckland Harbour in 1985

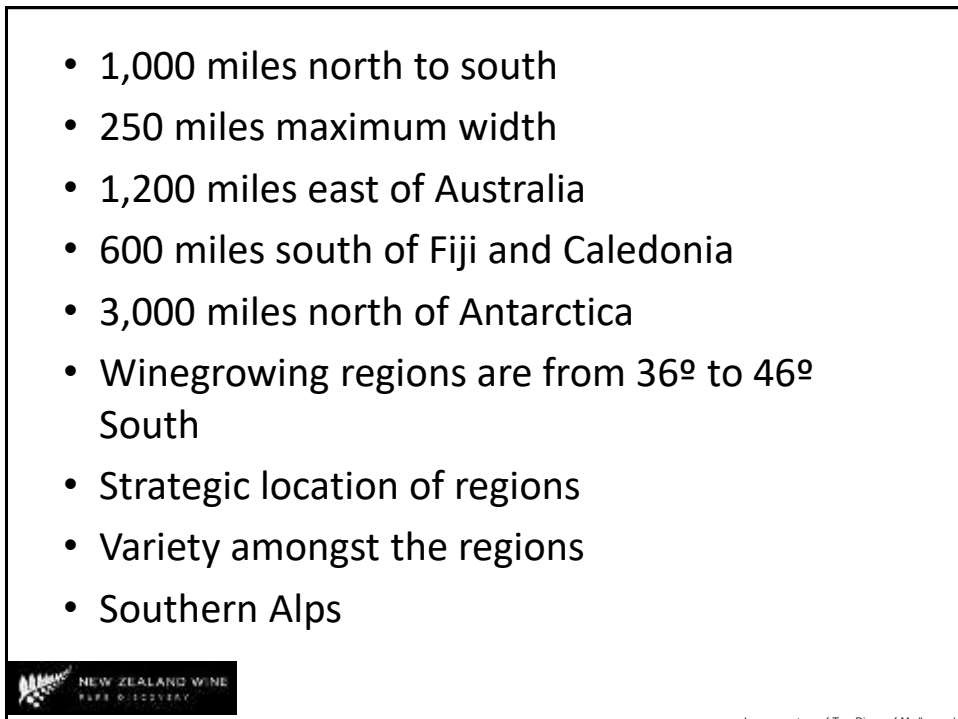

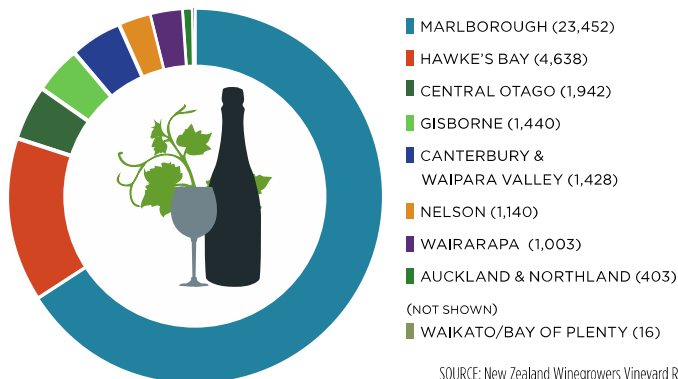
- Dawn of a new era

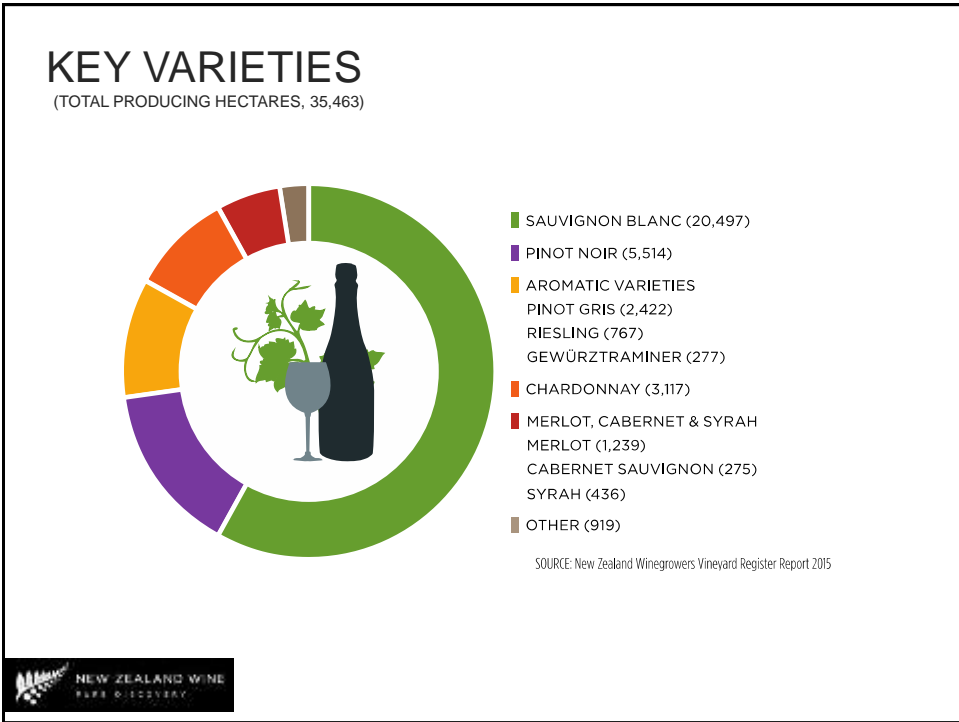
PRODUCING VINEYARD AREA
