Draw your own maps from memory: Use active learning & active recall to create visual tools specific to what you need to learn

Context, context, context: Make it meaningful and provide context to the "dots on the map" so you are not just memorizing random blips of information

Chunk it good: Divide the content into meaningful groups of information small enough to commit to memory in one sitting

Embrace Space: Use your spatial intelligence (and Google Maps) to provide real-world context (distance, latitude, direction) to your map work
